
The Green Gateway Park Project

In 1961, the Lower Crown Woolen Mill, which once stood at the site of the new Green Gateway, closed its doors forever. This was a significant event in the history of Marcellus, as the village had been founded upon the mill industry. However, small-town factory businesses proved to be unnecessary—impractical even— as Marcellus entered the Modern Era. This was the last major mill to be operating in the village, and many say its closing ended an era of Marcellus history.

For over 50 years, the mill's structure remained standing, though it saw little maintenance, instead deteriorating painfully and slowly. The structure was finally fully demolished in 2016, but nothing more than an old and vacant industrial site remained. The future of this parcel of land, one of the first sights visitors would see entering on Route 174 from the north, was very uncertain.

In 2005, ESF student Benjamin Vilonen, under the supervision of Professor Scott Shannon and encouragement of former Mary Fred Eisenberg,



conducted a study of the l and and found several potential improvements that could be made. Among these were additional fishing access to Ninemile Creek, an outdoor classroom space, and an arboretum. These plans resurfaced over a decade later, when in 2018 the Marcellus Village Board examined taking similar plans into fruition. Shortly after, Marcellus student Andrew Krammer, looking for a realworld application of environmental science content, took on the daunting project of making something of the abandoned site. With cooperation from the Village of Marcellus, the land was purchased and efforts were soon underway to both open a new park and create a new green gateway for visitors entering the village.

As the project continued, it soon became clear that plenty of potential remained within the site. New projects to improve the environments conditions and accessibility of the part were proposed, and more and more Marcellus student came to be involved with what the school district and village hope to be a continuing project.

An Outdoor Classroom space has been constructed for use by students and staff, as well as a walking path that will eventually tie into the existing creek walk originating at Marcellus Park. A lookout platform, looking underneath the North Street Bridge, is planned, as is the continued removal of invasive plants and trees, with the replacement of native sustainable plants in a planned arboretum. There has also been an effort to present erosion of the creek bank by the wise use of cross vanes. The entrance has been regraded, a handicapped fishing platform is planned, and a bridge has been installed that spans the school property to the green gateway.

The History of the Town Clock

Because, as a child, she often hurried up West Main Street to school, not knowing whether she would be late, Mrs. George Case was inspired with the idea of donating a clock to be placed in the Methodist Church tower. From the time of its installation in 1909 until the opening of the Central School on Reed Parkway in 1937, the clock served to hurry the dawdlers and reassure the early birds, as they climbed the hill to the old school.



History of the Village Tavern

In the period after the Civil War, John Duggan's Cottage Saloon, situated on the site of the present Village Tavern, served fish fry and beer on Fridays for a nickel, and in 1910 underwent a major renovation. While a new three-story structure was built around it, the Cottage Saloon continued to be open for business. When the exterior was completed, the interior was renovated. Upon Duggan's death, his son took over the business, advertised in I 914 as "C.B. Duggan's Hotel, a metropolitan barroom". A wag commented later that Mr. Duggan had completed rebuilding his place of business "just in time for prohibition". During prohibition, Edward Williams had a grocery in the building and in 1938, Louis Newell reopened the old Cottage Saloon under the name of Newell's Grill. The New York State law, after

the repeal of prohibition, banned use of the term "saloon". To qualify for a liquor license, certain requirements specifying the serving of food had to be met. Thus ,,,..:...- the terms "grill" and "tavern" came into common usage. In 1959, Ed ward Sennett became proprietor, and Newell's Grill became Sennett's Village Tavern. In I 978, Sennett sold the business to Betty Manning, and in 1984, the Village Tavern became the property of Gary and Kate Demers. In 2004, the business was sold to three individu-



als: Greg Strait, Jackie Strait, and Ray Nesci. Chad Clark became the current owner in 2012, making many updates to the building and atmosphere of the Tavern.
